

Primary PE and Sport Premium Report for 2016/2017

The Primary PE and Sport Premium was launched by the government in April 2013 and is available for four years to July 2017. It is ring-fenced funding to be used by the school to achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. It is important to emphasise that the focus of spending must lead to long lasting impact against the vision (below) that will live on well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium funding.

The national vision is for: *“All pupils leaving primary school [to be] physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.”*

In academic year 2016/17, we received £10,680. Having consulted with pupils and parents, and to support our wider vision and plans for PE and sport, we spent the Premium in the following ways.

Key Indicators

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles, including any additional provision for swimming funded by the premium.
2. The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. Increased participation in competitive sport

We have attended over 20 competitive sporting events, taking 120 pupils. These pupils have demonstrated a developed level of teamwork, interpersonal skills, resilience towards defeat and sportsmanship qualities during victories.
			SEND	The mini-bus has also enabled 10 SEND pupils to access several competitive festivals specifically

After each SEND festival there is an increase in the number of SEND pupils accessing our school's extra-curricular sports programme. This has helped increase the profile of SEND specific sports (i.e. Boccia, Goal Ball) across the whole school with all pupils experiencing these sports for the first time.</p> <p>The mini-bus continues to be used for developing the school's Outdoor Adventurous Activities programme in both curriculum and extra-curriculum timetables. The school's O.A.A programme has provided participating pupils with the foundation skills and inspiration to join local scout clubs, Young leader schemes and secondary school 'Duke of Edinburgh' schemes.</p>
1,3,4	External Specialist Coaching	£3,000	EYFS Pupils	<p>Green Lane Primary continues to work with Yogabug's 'Impact & Change' programme. Every Reception pupil participates in 35 Yogabugs sessions throughout the year. The pupil's progress is tracked throughout the programme, culminating in an individual progress report and participation certificate. This year 95% of pupils achieved their expected levels of progress, demonstrating a strong base of motor skills to build on in KS1 PE.</p>
			Y1-4 Pupils	<p>Future Elite continue to deliver KS1 & Lower KS2 gymnastics within the curriculum timetable. These sessions are delivered to an extremely high standard, providing both pupils and teachers with a working example of excellence in gymnastics. Teacher's subject confidence has improved since working with Future Elite and the pupils are all working to a higher level in gymnastics when entering Year 5.</p>
1,4,5	Middlesbrough Schools Teaching Alliance Sports Partnership	£800	KS2 Pupils	<p>Green Lane Primary has entered over 20 competitive sports events this year with the majority coming from the MSTTA partnership. 120 pupils have experienced competitive sport at an Inter-school level. The success our school pupils have experienced in these competitions has inspired other pupils to sign up to sports clubs in school and locally. This year our KS2 extra-curricular participation levels have increased from 41% (Term 1) to 62% (Term 3), clearly demonstrating the effect of our sports teams success on the whole school population. This increase in extra-curricular participation helped the school obtain its target of Gold in the 'School Games Award'.</p>

1,2,3,4	Acklam Sports Partnership	£1100	KS1 & KS2 Pupils	This year Green Lane Primary has accessed 7 different taster courses in a variety of alternative sports delivered by the ASP. These sessions included Hula Hooping, Fencing, Frisbee, Fruity Booty Fitness and Judo. These sessions have provided excellent CPD for our staff, demonstrating new ideas, games and sports that they can deliver within other areas of the curriculum leading to an 'Active School'.
1,2,4	Sports Equipment	£1,700	KS1 Pupils KS2 Pupils	<p>This year Green Lane Primary has invested in new equipment specifically for developing 'throwing and catching' skills in KS1. This equipment includes alternative balls, bean bags and objects that can be comfortably thrown and caught by young pupils. Since this equipment has been used, pupils are showing increased levels of engagement with throwing and catching games, with the majority demonstrating an improved skill level.</p> <p>KS2 pupils have benefited from new Netballs, Footballs, Rugby Balls, Basketballs and Kwik Cricket equipment. This new equipment means that all 3 classes in each year group can participate in PE with the correct amount of equipment for their lesson. The school has also invested in Goal Ball equipment for the Y5/6 Sports Leaders. This equipment is being used to develop the profile of SEND alternative sports across the whole school. Sports leaders have enjoyed learning this new sport, which they will then deliver to their peers. This will hopefully encourage pupils to demonstrate strong leadership and communicational skills.</p>

Sustainability / What Next?

The school has a strong ethos towards inclusive sport for all pupils regardless of ability. This has been once again demonstrated by the increase in pupils participating in extra-curricular sport and competitive events. We continue to embed good practice in PE through the Sports Coordinator and specialist staff, which has positively impacted on the confidence of school staff when delivering PE lessons. We continue to look for ways to improve our school culture towards PE and sport, building on the recent success of achieving the 'School Games Gold Award'. Green Lane Primary now needs to enhance its indoor sports facilities, ensuring that the new Sports Hall is equipped with appropriate resources to support our staff in the future.
